Supporting Children's Intentions

 □ Focus on children's strengths and interests. ○ What is the child doing now? Pay close attention to children as they explore and play. Be on or at the child's level.
 How can you support the child's <u>continued</u> interaction with materials he enjoys? Engage in communication give and take with children.
Learn to read "signals."
 Anticipate children's interactions. Understand the importance of sensory-motor explorations and the child as "explorer" and "scientist." Understand how to make best use of assessment data.
Encourage and acknowledge children's choices in exploration and play.
 Say what you see and learn how to be "attentively present." Learn when to ask questions, when to make comments, and when to stay silent.
 Help children achieve what they set out to do. Learn the art of scaffolding. Understand what it means to engage in joint attention.
Give children time to solve problems they encounter with materials.
 Become familiar with each child's level of "tolerable stress" and "reasonable challenge."
 Support children's developing capacities for self- regulation.
 Support children in resolving social conflict. Learn the steps of effective active problem solving fine-tuned for young preschoolers.
