### Overview of Book

# Vocabulary

Books are a rich source of words new to children. Here are some words from *Vehicles* to introduce in your classroom:

Types of trucks, airplanes, buses Blimp Hot air balloon Articulated bus Safari

Each time you read the book, highlight 2 or 3 words.

Use age-appropriate definitions and/or refer to the illustrations to help children understand each word's meaning.

# Reading Tips

This board book lends itself to conversations and does not need to be read fully from front to back. Let the children choose what interests them from among the illustrations. Name the illustration the child is focused on and use that as a springboard for vocabulary and more complex language. Draw connections to the children's lives outside school, reminding them of those vehicles that are familiar. Use fun and active language to describe what the vehicles sound like as they move about.

Three readings are recommended to familiarize children with the story. During each reading the adult can introduce new vocabulary words, pose open-ended questions, and engage children in activities that make the story "come alive."

### Throughout the Routine

Refer to the book throughout the day and use new vocabulary words in meaningful ways. Active engagement with the story helps the content come alive.

Bring out all the various vehicles you have for **Group Time**. Talk about those that look like the book and those that are different. See if the children begin to group them like the categories in the book.

Move like the various vehicles as you **Transition.** 

Sing songs about different vehicles for **Music** and movement times.

### Around the Room

Highlight the book's content and build on the children's excitement in a variety of locations.

Add some new types of vehicles to the **Block Area**. Add a steering wheel and see if the children choose to 'drive' whatever type of vehicle they imagine.

Place photos of vehicles from around the world throughout the classroom.

Consider adding various wheels or other round objects to the **Art Area**.

## Active Engagement

Reading with infants and toddlers is all about relationship, connection, and words.

There is no hurry with this book, so take your time and follow the children's lead. They may want to linger on their favorite vehicles.

As children are ready, use some open-ended questions to further the back and forths:
Where is that car going?
Who is riding on that bus?

Where would you fly on an airplane?

What kind of noise does that big truck make?
